Tuesday, October 20 Scarborough by Catherine Hernandez John Clement

Scarborough follows the lives of three children who inhabit Toronto's low-income east end. The story is an ode to a community Hernandez knows intimately, but the intersectionality and diversity of the stories of the people she portrays are universal.

(This title is offered to us by the Aurora Library's program, 'onebookoneaurora' and will supply us with the books.)

Tuesday, November 17 Rabbit Foot Bill by Helen Humphreys Lorraine

A lonely boy in a prairie town (Saskatchewan) befriends a tramp in 1947 and then witnesses a shocking murder. Based on a true story.

Tuesday, December 15 Notre Dame by Ken Follett Barb York

Ken Follett tells the story of the Cathedral, from its construction to the role it has played across time and history.

Tuesday, January 19The Dutch House by Ann PatchettHelen Roberts

A dysfunctional family story, told over five decades, begins in a grandiose mansion where the former owners had left all their belongings, including their portraits on the walls. A complex story of a family and of relationships made and broken and made again. *(Finalist for the 2020 Pulitzer prize for fiction.)*

Tuesday, February 16 The Golem and the Jinni by Helene Wecker Norm Zapata

Combining the genre of historic fiction with elements of fantasy, *The Golem and the Jinni* tells the story of two displaced magical creatures in 19th century New York City.

Tuesday, March 16The Splendid and the Vile by Eric LarsonNels Patterson

An intimate chronicle of Winston Churchill and London during the Blitz—an inspiring portrait of courage and leadership in a time of unprecedented crisis.

Tuesday, April 20Jefferson's Daughters: Three Sisters, White and Black, in a
Young America by Catherine Kerrison Linda Longhurst

Biography: the remarkable untold story of Thomas Jefferson's three daughters—two white and free, one black and enslaved.

Tuesday, May 18 Do Not Say We Have Nothing by Madeleine Thien Sarah Huels

Follows a ten-year old girl and her mother who invite a Chinese refugee into their home. (Awarded both the Scotiabank Giller Prize, and the Governor General's Award)
